My first round game was a bad start to the tournament as it was delayed for 2 hours. However, I was lucky to draw against India - the first of 6 draws! (The other draws were to Venequela, Bolivia, Argentina, Argentina and Columbia). Unfortunately, my only "win" was to Indonesia on forfeit! - and my four losses were to France, Chile, Brazil Austria. It was particularly annoying that 3 of my losses were from better positions! Anyway, I finished 14th and

although I wasn't happy with my play, the tournament was an invaluable experience.

People were very friendly and supportive - both the Spanish and Paraguayan seconds offered to help me with adjournments should I need it! It was also great to meet people such as GM's Najdorf (who opened the tournament), Rosetta, Panno, Joel Benjamin and the Polgars!

In short the whole experience (the chess, meeting people from many different countries and seeing a different country) was overwhelming and I feel very lucky to have been able to participate in such an event.

Final placing are:

1st Aladjjova (Bulg) 9.5 (won on count-back); 2nd Kahiani (USSR) 9.5; 3rd J. Polgar ([10 years] Hung) 9; 4th Bojkovic (Yug) 7.5; 5th Villegas (Arg) 6.5; 6th Kientzler (Fra) 6.5.

With the help of many people and organisations who donated money and put a lot of effort into various fund-raising activities, I managed to raise close to \$2000 which covered a large part of my airfares.

Thanks are due to the following organisations: ACF (who paid my entry fee), A WCL, QWCL, NSWJCL and to all of the individuals whose generous support made it possible to go.

The Olympiad Appeal has been successful. The Federal Government grant of \$8500 plus the appeal donations have more than covered the fares of the two teams and captains. Fortunately the fares to Dubai and back were under \$1000, cheaper than Europe. Regrettably no Australian newspaper is covering the daily results, and we are not receiving any telexes from Dubai (apparently it is too costly). We have telephoned Dubai daily but have only received very sketchy reports. As we go to press after rd 7 Womens team Seychelles 3-0, France 0-3, Wales 1-2, Dominican Republic 1½-1½. Rd 5, 6, 7 ? 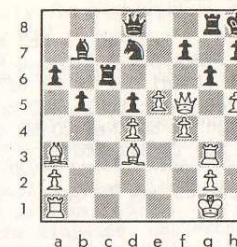

WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP
GAUSDA (NORWAY) 4-18TH AUGUST

This year, the World Junior Championship was one of the strongest (if not the strongest) ever held. There were 2 GM's, 10 IM's, 4 FM's and 13 players with an ELO of over 2200 plus 20 players with a national rating over 2000.

Agdestein(Norway),Granda (Peru),Bareeu (USSR) and Hellers (Swe) were all favourites but Anand (Ind), Klingner (Ost), Barua (Ind) and Piket (Neth) were also expected to do well.

The venue was Gausdai in a winter hotel in the middle of the mountains. A wonderful place! Unfortunately I was feeling very depressed and tired and if that wasn't enough, I didn't have a second (compare this with Piket's second GM Van Der Wiel).

The role of a second is not only to analyse adjourned games; it's to help you to recover when you lose and to give the player advice.
